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Preface and Acknowledgments

The purpose of this book is to present in high relief the orbit in which two scholars, one English, one German, played a leading role in establishing classical Indology in Europe. To document this formative period in the history of that discipline, we offer an extensively annotated edition of the heretofore unpublished correspondence of August Wilhelm von Schlegel and Henry Thomas Colebrooke. Colebrooke's letters to Schlegel and some draft letters from Schlegel to Colebrooke are part of a large archive of correspondence Schlegel had with colleagues, friends, and family, preserved at the Sächsische Landesbibliothek – Staats- und Universitätsbibliothek, Dresden (SLUB: MS Dresd. e90/XIX/5, nos. 36–67), currently in the process of being digitized. Schlegel's letters to Colebrooke, to the contrary, are the only correspondence of Colebrooke with a colleague which appears to be extant. Long preserved in the Colebrooke family, they were gifted to the Asia, Pacific and Africa Collections of the British Library in 1998 (APAC: MSS EUR/C841).

The letters Schlegel and Colebrooke exchanged over a span of seventeen years – the last of Colebrooke's life – constitute a leading thread in a web of correspondence and activities in which European scholars engaged in the course of founding western Indology. In notes to the letters we pursue related discussions Schlegel and Colebrooke had with fellow scholars, friends, and family, and, in Schlegel's case, with Prussian officials in charge of education. We also point to parallel considerations they addressed in their works, published and unpublished. A companion to our recently released biography of Colebrooke, the present volume places a greater emphasis on Schlegel, who initiated the exchange and brought up most items for discussion.

As was the norm for Schlegel's communications beyond the German domain, his letters to Colebrooke were written in French and signed "de Schlegel," with the mark of nobility that had been revived for his family in 1813, and on which he insisted to the point of inserting a missing "de" on a copy he kept of an issue of the *Athenaeum* of 10 March 1832 that announced his visit to London. Colebrooke answered in English.

French spelling underwent changes during Schlegel's lifetime. His letters, the earlier ones in particular, tend to adhere to an older style. His use of accents – as that of some of his French contemporaries – is erratic, particularly in drafts. Older spellings and accents, or the lack thereof, are printed here as written, without notice. We reserve the marker [sic] for distinct oddities in spelling and syntax. Drafts, and occasionally letters, feature some erasures, which are indicated as such in this edition. In a few cases in which a letter is preserved in draft and final forms, the final text is printed, with significant erasures and changes from the draft in brackets.

Unless the context clearly indicates otherwise, "Schlegel," without first name, refers to August Wilhelm, "Colebrooke" to Henry Thomas, "Staël" to Auguste, "Johnston" to Alexander, "Humboldt" to Wilhelm, "Chézy" to Antoine Léonard, and "Burnouf" to Eugène.

We wish to acknowledge the helpfulness of the staff of the Asia, Pacific and Africa Collections of the British Library and of the manuscript division of the Sächsische Landesbibliothek – Staats- und Universitätsbibliothek, Dresden, Ms Kerstin Schellbach in particular, during repeated visits. We also thank these institutions for providing us with scans of two letters, one of Schlegel, the other of Colebrooke, to serve as illustrations for this volume. The latter appears by permission of the SLUB, the former with the consent of Mr C. C. F. Naylor, to whom we are also indebted for granting us full access to the Colebrooke Family Papers and unrestricted permission to quote from them.

The manuscript divisions of the National Library of Scotland and of the Universitäts- und Landesbibliothek, Bonn responded promptly and fully to our requests for information and documents. We are also grateful to Mr Peter Wyzlic, of the South Asia library, University of Bonn, for help with archival data. Material collected during earlier visits to other collections in the course of research for our biography of Colebrooke, has been of value again for this volume, as will be evident from our list of References. As ever, we benefited from the unstinting support of staff in the South Asia and Rare Books divisions of the University of Pennsylvania library and its interlibrary network.
